On Professor K. M. Saiful Islam

Professor KM Saiful Islam department of Information Science and Library Management of Dhaka University (DU) died of a cardiac arrest at his residence on 31st July 2017 at the age of 68. To honor the memory of our legendary teacher TLT is happy to publish a special feature on his life and professional career.

Education and academic career:

Professor Dr. KM Saiful Islam passed matriculation examination from Zikirganj High School in 1957 and passed IA from MM College in Jessore in 1959.

He joined at DU Information Science and Library Management Department as lecturer on July 1, 1975 and went to retirement as professor on June 29, 2009. He was promoted as an Assistant Professor on 12th December, 1978, Associate Professor on 17th April, 1988 and Professor on 21 July 1993. Professor Dr. KM Saiful Islam was the chairman of the department since 1988 to 1990.

Before joining to University of Dhaka Dr Islam obtained BA degree from Dhaka College in 1961 and MA degree in Library Science from University of Karachi, Pakistan in 1963. He studied and worked in Great Britain with Scholarship for completing his PhD thesis. Later he pursued post-doctoral research project on 'public library systems and services' in Great Britain and on comparative studies in automation system in Malaysia with scholarship administered by the Association of Commonwealth Universities.

Research and fellowship:

His PhD thesis entitled “A Code for Cataloguing and Indexing Bangladeshi Muslim, Hindu and Buddhist Name” has been a great, original contribution to solve outstanding, burning problems of the treatment of Bangladeshi oriental names in the libraries of Bangladesh. He gained international recognition in contributing the ‘Bangladesh’ chapter in the international cataloguing manual: “IFLA’s Names of Persons: National Usage for Entry in Catalogues” published by K. G. Saur from Munchen, New Providence, London and Paris in 1996 (briefly called IFLA UBCIM’ 96) which is used and taught throughout the world.

He obtained several research and fellowship grants includes;

- a. Association of Commonwealth Universities fellowship to complete a post-doctoral project on Comparative studies in Library automation, University of Malaya, 1995
- b. British Council senior fellowship in Gt. Britain [1989] to complete a post-doctoral research project, *Public library systems and services in Great Britain and Bangladesh* [published]
- c. Charles Wallace Trust fellowship (1983) for research studies in Britain to complete remaining parts of Ph.D. thesis on the treatment of Bangladeshi names.
- d. Research grantship from University Grants Commission, Bangladesh [1976-80] to complete a research project on Cataloguing of Muslim names.



Professor Islam was also a Rabindra Sangeet singer at BTV. Besides his family and professional life he was very much interested in gardening, angling, hunting, fishing, photography, nature and animal world.

I owe to my father for my life and I owe to my teachers for my knowledge. Similarly I owe to Professor K. M. Saiful Islam sir for my LIS knowledge. One of the young teachers during my period S. M. Mannan informed us about K.M Saiful Islam's sincerity on timing when I admitted to the department. When he wrote something on Black board, we should follow and copy everything without asking any questions. He used anti-dust chalk to write, if we questioned him at the time of writing, he just voiced- no talk. After the copying of that writing we automatically understood the matter. He used a radio antenna as a stick to teach us writing. He was the only teacher, who used a leather stylist briefcase in the class.

He was a stylist person. He used to wear white dresses, white belt, white shoes, white tie, but his briefcase was only the cream colour. He was called white man sir!

He taught us cataloguing system, especially card catalogue preparation under the AACR-2 and ALA-49.

He also taught us on Cutter figure for author mark, from his old sheet. We memorised the system of using, if the starting of the entry bye... the figure will be...

We forgot the rules and we are now using LC's Shanbourn cutter figure automatically through the software.

We learnt MARC from him, but did not see at that time. We are using it now after a long time of learning. He taught us online catalogue in 1992/1993. And we memorized the comparison of different type of cataloguing.

Now we are providing OPAC support to the patrons and to our tertiary users worldwide. Besides, he taught us cataloguing theory and practice and the special library as our specialization. His philosophy on money was, "Money is the secondary issue, but the willingness is the main to do well." I follow this motto.

I pray for the salvation of his soul, May Allah grants him Jannah (Ameen).

A new gold medal was introduced at Information Science and Library Management Department of Dhaka University (DU) after the name of its former principal lab instructor Md Shahid Ullah.

Wife of late Shahid Ullah, Hasina Akter on Monday handed over a cheque for Tk 10 lakh to DU vice-chancellor professor AAMS Arefin Siddique at a function at his office on the campus for launching the gold medal titled 'Shahid Ullah Gold Medal', said a DU press release.

Arts Faculty dean professor Abu Md Delwar Hossain, Information Science and Library Management Department chairman professor Muhammad Mezbah-ul-Islam, professor of the department Saiful Islam, acting registrar of the university and family members of the donor were present, among others, at the function, the release added.

Out of the income of the donation, every year one meritorious student of DU Information Science and Library Management Department will be awarded 'Md Shahid Ullah Gold Medal' for securing the highest CGPA in MA final examination, the release also said.

Addressing the function, professor Arefin Siddique thanked the donor for funding to introduce the gold medal and hoped that the students would be highly benefited and encouraged by the award to carry out outstanding academic and research activities.

Late Md Shahid Ullah was born in 31 December, 1950 in Noakhali district and died on 2 November 2016 in the capital city.

Digital, Youth and Employability: Role of a Modern Library

Through access to information and technology, modern libraries can play a crucial role in youth employability, participants discussed at the IID policy breakfast held in Dhaka on 26 July 2017.

Globally, library services have been transformed by Information and Communication Technology (ICT). Although, government's Vision 2021 Digital Bangladesh aims to convert libraries into digital libraries, the use of ICT in library services is yet to take off in Bangladesh. According to the findings of NextGen survey, 75 per cent of the youth agreed that there is lack in ICT education of the country's education system. In this context, IID, as the Policy Partner of the Libraries Unlimited programme, organised this policy breakfast in partnership with the British Council.

The policy breakfast on "Digital, Youth and Employability: Role of a Modern Library" focused on aspects of digitalisation in domains of a library space and also suggested that rural school libraries could be connected to the district level libraries to build a knowledge based society. The session also emphasised on responding to the needs of skills deficit of youth not in employment, education or training with a special focus on increasing opportunities for employability using ICT services as the knowledge hub of libraries.

The panelists included Zunaid Ahmed Palak MP, the Honourable State Minister for ICT Division, Ministry of Posts, Telecommunications and Information Technology; Sir Ciarán Gearoid Devane, Chief Executive, British Council; Barbara Wickham, Director, British Council Bangladesh, among others. Syeed Ahamed, CEO of IID, facilitated the session.

Participants included representatives from government, political parties, library professionals, academics, CSO/ NGOs, development partners, among other relevant stakeholders.
