New Initiative

Open Access Bangladesh has began its journey

Open Access, Bangladesh Chapter, has begun its journey aiming to provide free and immediate online access to research articles, coupled with the rights to use them fully in the digital environment. The inception ceremony was held on February 17 at Karwan Bazar, Dhaka. A 15member committee has been formed to work with policy makers, managers, researchers and scholarly societies to adopt a policy to take the open access movement forward in Bangladesh . Prime Minister's Office librarian Kanok Monirul Islam has been made the convener, while Dr Susmita Das and Engineer Shuvra Rani Kar have been named as joint convener and member secretary respectively. As a convener Mr. Islam has delivered a presentation during the ceremony highlighting on the possibilities of Open Access in the country. A good number of researchers, academics, journalists, publishers, IT specialists and librarians present. Golam Mustafa, publisher of Hakkani Publishers and Biologist Dr Anisuzzaman Khan were also present in that ceremony.

Editorial

ALIA report: Relevance 2020, LIS Research in Australia

In this issue, I am just thinking to share an idea from recent launch of ALIA report: Relevance 2020, LIS Research in Australia. Having this report might be a significant one to regenerate our thinking level in developing our library profession through this type of research report in Bangladesh. We have LAB and BALID with the balance of qualified academics and professional office bearers. However, their role in LIS research to progress the professional excellence is evidently low.

The Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA), in partnership with Charles Sturt University, has issued a report which provides the results of six Library and Information Science (LIS) research events in Australian capitals in late 2016 that had the main purpose of connecting academics, researchers and practitioners in order to help align future research projects and activities in the Australian LIS profession. There were 172 participants from LIS schools, academic, special, TAFE, school, public and state libraries.

The following seven barriers to research and collaboration were identified:

Awareness and perception

Connection and relationship

Funding

Passion and enthusiasm

Research culture and support

Research expertise

Shared understanding and interest

Finally, the report recommends the followings:

- 1. Libraries and librarians should change the perception of their roles to include research as part of their role specification. This would be a powerful catalyst for a more dynamic, evidence-based profession.
- 2. LIS schools and academics should be active players in fostering collaboration between academia and practice. Applied research should not be regarded as less important than research of a more theoretical nature.
- 3. More consideration might be given by LIS academics to some of the priority areas for their practitioner counterparts, such as information services and the promotion of these services. 4. ALIA should continue to play a role that bridges the gap between academic and practitioner needs. Consideration should be given to a central database of research ideas and experts, and to strategically providing further funding opportunities to members.

What should be the LAB and BALID roles in this viewpoint?
