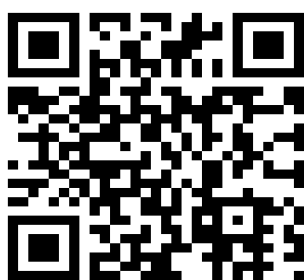

A further 20 countries have joined the International Advocacy Programme (IAP) to work on raising awareness about the 2030 Agenda and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), the essential role libraries play in development, and to help participants to develop an advocacy plan for their country.

"If a country wants to achieve the United Nations 2030 Agenda, this will not be possible without libraries. We need to bring this to the attention of policy makers and the United Nations. IFLA will support you to achieve this." – IFLA Secretary General, Gerald Leitner.

Two more IFLA IAP Regional Workshops were held in February and March 2017, bringing together participants from a further 20 countries to join the International Advocacy Programme (IAP). This capacity building initiative was launched by IFLA in the last quarter of 2016 and has now seen six regional workshops organised, with almost 150 participants in total.

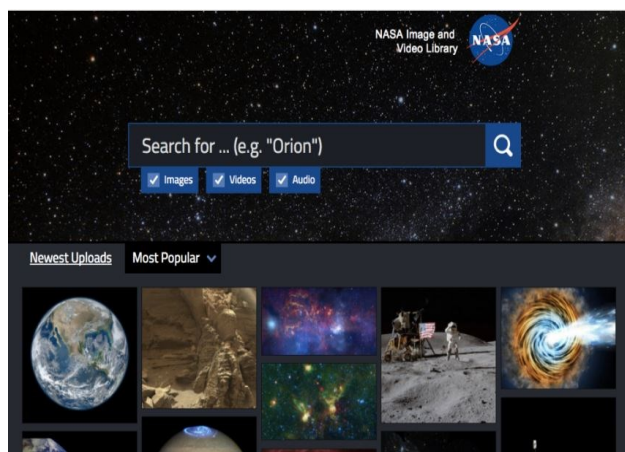
Libraries as a luxury item

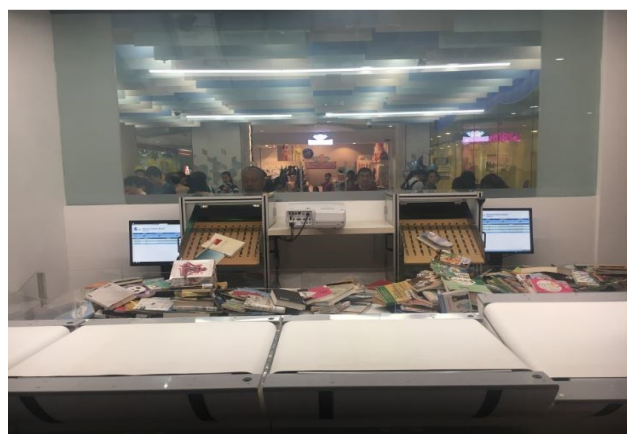


NASA's new searchable media library is a treasure trove of space pics and video

Do you like space? Do you like looking at it, wishing you were there instead of here, perhaps? Well NASA just did something that will make your day. The U.S. space agency launched a new web-based search engine for much of its catalog of images, video and audio files, which you can browse by keyword and metadata, so that you never have to remember the dismal reality that you're earthbound ever again. NASA's Image and Video Library website is officially "Where I belong," and features everything it could possibly need: A big, easy to find search bar where you can type things like "asteroid," "supernova," or "reptilian" to find exactly what you're looking for. You can also filter only specific kinds of content, and sort results by recency of their upload date, or by popularity.

Imagining libraries of the future

SINGAPORE: From the use of data analytics, to possibly even virtual reality in the future - public libraries in Singapore are undergoing a transformation in a bid to remain relevant in an increasingly digital world. Just over a week old, the new Sengkang Public Library is home to more than 125,000 books, digital content and customised spaces for different age groups. It is the first of four new libraries opening this year in what some may call next generation libraries - no longer just a place to read and borrow books, but also increasingly where the community can come together and learn together as well.

Nirmala Kumar, a 53-year-old who has been a librarian for more than 15 years, notes that not only are library users different, her job has changed considerably as well.

Towards a Competitive and Sustainable Open Access Publishing Market in Europe

Open AIRE has released Towards a Competitive and Sustainable Open Access Publishing Market in Europe.

Here's an excerpt:

Without intervention, immediate OA to just half of Europe's scientific publications will not be achieved until 2025 or later. Readers in academia have greater access, to more content, than ever before. Despite this, the majority of publications arising from public investments in research remain inaccessible to the public, and the growth of OA appears to be slowing.

This study considers the economic factors contributing to the current state of the open access publishing market, and evaluates the potential for European policymakers to enhance market competition and sustainability in parallel to increasing access.

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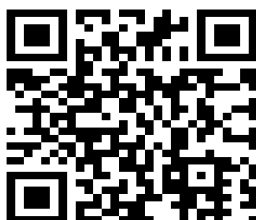
