
Human Library Dhaka Session held at British Council

The British Council in collaboration with the Human Library Bangladesh organized Human Library Dhaka Session two between 11.00 to 5.00 pm on Friday December 15, 2017 at the British Council premise, Dhaka University Campus. The main theme of the event was to promote tolerance and empathy through connecting people from a different faiths, values and cultures.

A Human Library is a global initiative started from Copenhagen in 2000. It brings a diverse set of people together from different cultures, backgrounds, thoughts and beliefs here in our society to share their perspectives and thoughts; and allow the reader, to learn their life stories. The concept of Human Library is: a list of people available to be 'borrowed' and visitors are free to opt

out a person who interests them and sit with them to hear their story, or just talk about a particular topic.



How does the Human Library work?

Step 1: The books (humans) gather at the venue with librarians/volunteers accompanying them. Readers come to the library and register themselves in order to get a library card.

Step 2: Then the readers are directed to the book list (human list). From that list, readers choose a particular book by showing their library cards.

Step 3: Then librarians/volunteers take readers to their chosen book and they sit together for 20-25 minutes; their conversation free to flow where it wishes - the 'book'

shares their experience and answers reader questions.

Step 4: The librarians/volunteers keep track of the session time and update the available booklist. A book usually gets minimum 10-15 minutes break after a session. After that, the book is again available in the booklist.

Child-friendly reading corners in 20 libraries nationwide completed

The Beyond Access Bangladesh project has been completed, with child-friendly reading corners set up in 20 community and public libraries across 11 districts in Bangladesh. In addition to providing reading materials for children at various levels, the project also offered training to the partner library staff.

Honorable Minister of Cultural Affairs, Asaduzzaman Noor presented as chief guest at the 'Library for Literacy' workshop, part of the 'Beyond Access project'; implemented by Save the Children-USA. The presentation was held at the conference room of Central Public Library in the capital; Director General of Public Library Department Mr. Ashish Kumar Sarker presided over the workshop.

According to a press release, officials from the Department of Public Libraries, the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), and various other nongovernmental and partner organizations gathered to celebrate the successful completion of the project at the Department of Public Libraries in Shahbagh, Dhaka, on December 5, 2017.

In his remark speech, the Minister said, "We are thinking of establishing the specialized libraries for children and adults and also working to make sure of their engagement in it. It is important to introduce such more initiatives to build children as a complete human being. Initiatives have already been taken to digitize and modernize the libraries of the country with the collaboration of the British Council."

"It is urgent to ensure the environment of cultural activities alongside the regular education to make their childhood enjoyable and secure their mental development. The government is also putting importance on the issue," he mentioned.

Inaugurating the workshop, Deputy Country Director of Save the Children-USA in Bangladesh, Dr. Ishtiaq Mannan said, "The libraries can play a special role to increase the interest in reading and developing children's learning skills. With this goal, the project has been implemented in 11 districts of the country with the assistance of AEXA and USAID Read Programs 2015.

At the same program, USAID Office of Population, Health, Nutrition, and Education Director Caroll Vazquez said: "By leveraging the resources of USAID, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, IREX, and the Department of Public Libraries, along with the expertise of Save the Children-USA, this project has created a model library that makes reading outside of school accessible and fun for children so that they can learn to read."

Beyond Access Bangladesh selected 20 community and public libraries in 11 districts to make use of the country's existing libraries as spaces for children and their families to enjoy reading, and access more reading materials. The project provided reading materials for children at various levels, supplied multiple computer and tablets with literacy-focused computer games, and trained library staff to use interactive reading games and other methods to help children learn to read.

The Beyond Access Bangladesh project is a component of USAID's 5-year READ project, which works to improve the quality of literacy instruction in 2,949 Government Primary Schools throughout Bangladesh.
